EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The dawn of the novel Corona virus disease – COVID 19 and the uncertainties around that period are now beginning to feel slightly distant especially with the advent of vaccines. Even though we are still grappling with the devastating effects of the pandemic in its past and current form, It is perhaps not too optimistic to think that we have gone past it's worse.

As we brace ourselves for what distal effects are to come, there are plenty of lessons that we have learnt as well as experiences that have been gained that will serve us as a race moving forward. The pandemic gave us the opportunity to demonstrate our collective humanity and to act in a unison in a time that compelled us to do so.

CamDocUK was at the forefront of a very willing Cameroonian civil society, navigating the uncharted waters with all its obstacles that this pandemic presented us. Amidst our educational activities around the pandemic, we launched an appeal to support our healthcare infrastructure back in Cameroon with resources to better withstand the tides of the pandemic. It is thanks to your generous response that this project has been possible.

CamdocUK set up a working group which in collaboration with HERO, Cameroon; A Cameroon based NGO were able to procure high quality personal protective equipment's (PPE) from China through a complex, multistage process involving some very fine negotiation and teamwork which has underpinned most of this project.

In a three phase distribution process, we successfully distributed 10000 gloves, 13000 masks, 1200 face shields, 1000 gowns and 100 Liters of hand sanitizers to 81 health facilities in 10 regions of Cameroon. Phase I (Pilot phase) saw the distribution of PPEs to district hospitals in the North West, South West and Western Regions – This phase also gave us a good understanding of the logistical challenges of this project including bureaucratic, safety and cultural barriers. The lessons from the first phase helped us deliver PPEs in district hospitals in the Littoral, Centre and far north regions during the second phase. In the final phase, we targeted key hospitals in the North, South, Adamawa and East Regions for distribution due to their relatively low COVID-19 cases and case fatalities. We also undertook a second round of distribution in the north west and south west regions in phase III to culminate in what we think has been a very successful project.

This project adds to the countless ways in which we all have played our part in this most ravaging of pandemics!

CHAPTER I - INTRODUCTION

1.1 PRESENTATION OF ORGANISATIONS

1.1.1 CAMEROON DOCTORS IN THE UK

The Association of Cameroonian Doctors in the UK (CamDocUK) is a combined initiative from doctors, dentists and other allied professionals of Cameroonian origin practicing in the United Kingdom. The objective of the organisation at inception was to establish a healthy environment for constructive debates on health care development in Cameroon. Through necessity and its early successes, CamDocUK has emerged as a major actor amongst Cameroonian civil society organisations. Its membership has grown exponentially in over a decade of existence to comprise an illustrious, cross-generational, vibrant, ever present and growing influence in healthcare in Cameroon. The organisation through its vast collective experience and networks has already made notable contributions to medical education and health care in Cameroon.

Amongst its notable partnerships, is a decade long collaboration with the Cameroon Medical Council (CMC).

The advent of the novel Corona virus disease – COVID 19 has seen CamDocUK in collaboration with sister health organisations across the world assume a central role, leading the fight against COVID – 19 from the very front with



valuable opinions and technical expertise. Beyond these expertise, it has also launched a massive fund raising campaign aimed at addressing key concerns from the home based medical workforce and general populace.

CamdocUK launched an intervention to provide the medical workforce across the Cameroonian territory with personal protective equipment (PPE). It was responsible for the procurement of “A” class personal protective equipment from China and in collaboration with a home based non-organisational – HERO, Cameroon has overseen the distribution of PPEs all over the national territory.

1.1.2 HEALTH EDUCATION & RESEARCH ORGANISATION (HERO), CAMEROON

Health Education and Research Organisation (HERO), Cameroon is a non-governmental, non-profit making organization. Their goal is to break the link between poor health & poverty by building capacity within local communities and increasing awareness on the most prevalent public health problems. HERO conducts non-partisan research which informs their health interventions which are context-specific and culturally very sensitive. They have a track record of working within local communities in many projects that are community led and within a framework of trust. Their motto: 'Health for all' underpins their objective to;

- Educate the public and create awareness on the growing health and economic impact of non-communicable diseases on the already enormous burden of infectious diseases in Cameroon.
- To promote a culture of research among Cameroonian youths and provide a data repository on the epidemiology of common health conditions in specific sub-populations.
- To promote the development of rural communities. Through health education and outreach campaigns, they aim to build capacity within local populations and increase their resilience and responsiveness to public health problems/emergencies – COVID 19 has been a good example.
- Create a reproducible model for tackling public health challenges in other resource limited settings beyond Cameroon.

1.2 PROJECT RELEVANCE AND NEED

On 31 December 2019, the local authorities of Wuhan (China), reported a cluster of pneumonia cases which turned out to be caused by a novel Coronavirus (COVID-19). As of March 2020, the virus has already spread in



all continents including Africa. Cameroon is one of the badly hit countries with over 1705 cases as of April 29, 2020. Fifty-eight (58) deaths had already been recorded. It is still unclear whether Cameroon has already hit its peak of COVID 19 infections but the all-cause mortality linked to COVID 19 is rising. On 30 January 2020, the WHO declared the recent COVID-19 outbreak as a **Public Health Emergency of International Concern (PHEIC)**.

Cameroon is a low-and -middle income country with a healthcare system lacking in essential human and critical resources needed for the proper functioning of its health system. The strain on its health system has been further compounded by the ongoing global pandemic related to COVID - 19. The lack of large scale super specialist care has made the implementation and strengthening of preventative systems and measures imperative.

There is good anecdotal emphasis around staff morale and the absence of personal protective equipment which worsens outcomes in outbreaks of this nature. The focus of CamDoc - UK's intervention has been to strengthen the human resource aspect of the health care system by securing and distributing personal protective equipment to government hospitals around the national territory.



CHAPTER II – SUMMARY OF PROJECT OBJECTIVES

The objective of CamDocUK' intervention will include but not limited to: -

1. Providing the general public with up-to-date information on all aspects of the epidemiology of COVID -19 especially knowledge on preventive strategies.
2. Provide technical expertise to the government and other principal actors on COVID -19 in Cameroon.
3. Provide health care workers across the country with personal protective equipment (PPE).
4. Promote a positive long term behavioural change related to pandemics of this nature but also in relation to healthcare in general (a new way of doing things).



CHAPTER III – PROJECT IMPLEMENTATION STRATEGY

3.1 TARGET POPULATION & SETTING

Cameroon, Central Africa with emphasis on its medical workforce. In 2018, The United Nation Development Programme (UNDP) ranked Cameroon in the medium Development Category – Its Human Development Index (HDI) value for 2018 was 0.563 positioning it at 150 out of 189.

The World Health Organisation (WHO) described Cameroon's health care system as one experiencing a crisis in human and essential resources needed for proper functioning of the health system.

3.2 MATERIAL RESOURCES

Assorted designs of all kinds of high quality personal protective equipment including reusable designs.

CHAPTER IV – PROJECT IMPLEMENTATION PROPER (INTERVENTION)

Two-part intervention, related to COVID-19 related health sensitization and the procurement and distribution of personal protective equipment.

4.1 HEALTH SENSITISATION

CamdocUK has already taken great strides in continually providing up-to-date information on the epidemiology of COVID 19 with emphasis on improving knowledge and practice of various preventative strategies. Simple and practical advice has already been produced in English, French and pidgin English and distributed through various official channels and social media platforms.

Moving forward, the team will continue to update its educative content as the guidance changes by -

- Producing more educative content including video demonstrations, infographics, webinars, opinion pieces and supportive policy documents.



4.2 PROCUREMENT & DISTRIBUTION OF PPE

4.2.1 TARGET POPULATION

The first phase of this project was implemented in the South West, North West and West regions of Cameroon.

4.2.2 PRE-INTERVENTION

HERO Cameroon received a total of **1200 face shields, 13000 masks, 10000 pairs of gloves 1000 gowns and 100 liters of hand sanitizers**, purchased by CAMDOC-UK. Two attempts were made to collect the item from Douala international airport, the second of which was successful. The items were then transferred and stored in a safe site in Buea.

Prior to distribution, the face shields were branded with the CAMDOC-UK logo, cartons were bought and branded with the CAMDOC-UK logo, and PPEs were packaged in branded cartons, and labelled with the names of specific health facilities. The number of PPE items in each carton was based on the size of and number of doctors in the respective health facilities.



4.2.3 INTERVENTION: PPE DISTRIBUTION

4.2.3.1 PHASE I: PPE DISTRIBUTION IN SOUTH WEST, NORTH WEST AND WEST REGION

In each of region, 10 district hospitals were selected based on district size, number of reported COVID-19 cases and nearness to the epicenter.

Members of our team distributed the PPEs to most health facilities, and in hard to reach areas, PPEs were sent to the hospitals via a third party. In each health facility, PPEs were handed over to hospital directors, or hospital administrators in the absence of the director. Thereafter, an acknowledgement form was signed and a copy handed to the HERO team, and pictures and videos were taken. Distribution proper was as follows: -



I. SOUTH-WEST REGION

PPE distribution in the South West Region was done from the 9th -14th August 2020. Table 1 shows the number of PPE items received by each health facility in the Southwest Region.

5.2.3.3 PHASE III: PPE DISTRIBUTION IN EAST, ADAMAWA, NORTH, SOUTH & REDISTRUBUTION IN THE SOUTH WEST AND NORTH WEST REGIONS.

Phase III took place in the month of September 2021. Before embarking on this phase a follow-up meeting was held between CamDoc-UK and HERO where it was unanimously agreed that a re-distribution be done in the northwest and southwest region with emphasis laid on the frontier health posts which were at high risk due to the influx of immigrants . Also, only regional hospitals would be targeted since they had all been allocated by the state to serve as treatment centers. It is on this note that the re-distribution plan was designed as shown below.

CONCLUSION

So far, HERO Cameroon has successfully distributed **10000 gloves, 13000 masks, 1200 face shields, 1000 gowns and 100Liters of hand sanitizers** to **81 health facilities in 10 regions** of Cameroon, on behalf of CAMDOC-UK.

CHALLENGES

- Frequent insecurity challenges were faced throughout the distribution process especially in the Northwest and Southwest regions
- Frequent checks and harassment from the forces of law and order were also faced during this exercise sometimes we were being ask to leave some face masks at the control post
- Lack of cooperation with the heads of some facilities: Some directors refused to sign our acknowledgement or take pictures. This made our justifications difficult
